Daily Notes for the week of October 22-25, 2018:

Unit Focus: Express Yourself

Weekly Learning Goals:

1. To create beautiful art for the campus.

2. To respond appropriately to specific statements or questions about the text.

Books: Tango Makes Three by Justin Richardson and Peter Parnell

1,2,3 A Family Counting Book by Bobbie Combs

Songs: Frozen Penguin by Caspar Babypants, 5 Little Pumpkins

Vocabulary (literacy): park, penguin, couple, egg

Vocabulary (math): tool, technology, pattern

Ms. Emilie's Room (math): Day 1 - Children will explore weight and circumference by measuring and comparing 2 large pumpkins. In learning centers, children will follow a recipe to make pumpkin dip and create a pumpkin drawing in their journal using a variety of shapes.

Day 2: Children will make predictions about what is inside a pumpkin, then carve the pumpkin and determine if their prediction was correct. In learning centers, children will explore the pumpkin patch in the sensory table and design a pumpkin face for Ms. Emilie to carve.

Ms. Jessica's Room (literacy): Day 1: Children will compare what penguins and people need to survive using a Venn diagram. In learning centers, children will make pumpkin prints using real pumpkins and write a journal entry about their family Halloween traditions.

Day 2: Children will brainstorm how different families display affection. We will also compare human affection to how animal families display affection. In learning centers, children will complete a handwriting activity building fine motor strength and letter recognition, as well as paint still life paintings of pumpkins and gourds.
